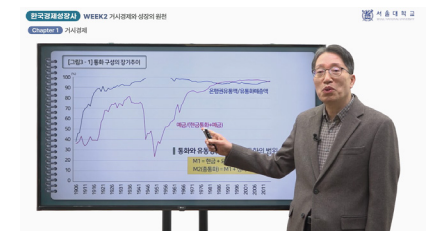

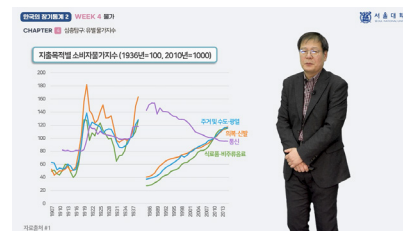

This course is ...



The course provides a systematic introduction to the statistics contained in *Historical Statistics Korea* (2018, Vol.2). This book consists of 11 sections: transportation and communication, service industry and public services, national income, prices, capital and wealth, science and technology, business organization, currency and financial system, government finance and employment, justice, and international trade and exchange rate. By examining how individual indicators in each sector evolved both before and after liberation, and how the different sectors have interacted, students will be able to get an empirical understanding of the long-term trends of Korean economy based on quantitative data.

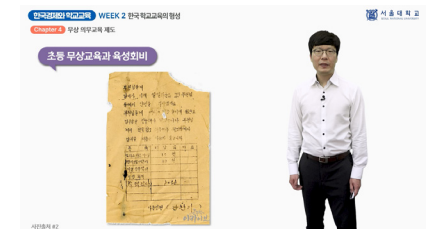

This course is ...

The course examines the birth, growth, and evolution of school education in Korea. School education has served as the driving force for Korea's economic growth through the accumulation of human capital. This lecture will be an opportunity to examine the process of establishing the institutional foundation of school education in Korea, including the elementary, secondary and higher education systems as well as non-formal education. It also evaluates this historical experience from various perspectives exploring the diverse challenges facing Korean school education today, including the problems of shadow education.

This course is ...



The course examines the history of Korean economy for the past 80 years focusing on foreign aid. The lectures will pay attention to the characteristics and impact of various foreign aid provided to Korea, particularly to policy coordination and resource allocation. It also explores Korea's transition from a recipient to a donor country. Students will gain a deep understanding of Korea's early economic growth and obtain various insights into international cooperation for development from both theoretical and practical perspectives.

By tracing their historical path, students will gain a deep understanding of East Asian railways and their ongoing role in shaping the future.

This course examines the history of land reclamation in Korea over time. It will focus on the social background, institutions, and technologies that have driven reclamation in Korea from the Joseon Dynasty to the present day. Students will gain an understanding of Korea as a world leader in reclamation, develop the ability to read the history of reclamation in the current coastal landscape, and have the opportunity to ponder on the relationship between nature, society and humanity.

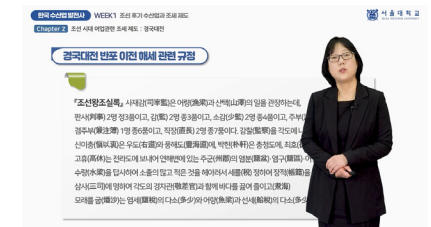

This course is ...

The course examines the history of Korean fishing industry and its development from the perspective of the evolution of fisheries laws. It presents the institutional process in which the traditional fishing rights have transformed into modern fisheries laws, as well as the history of the changes in actual fishing practices, using various historical documents and statistical data. Students will understand the importance of fisheries, the primary industry that has not received enough attention, in the Korean economy.

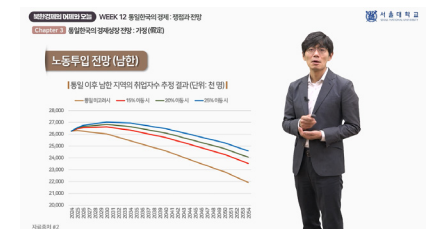

This course is ...

The course aims to understand the reality of the North Korean economy. It examines the historical process by which North Korean economy developed its unique characteristics, advocating socialist planned economy, but quite different in reality. It also looks at the various aspects of the North Korean economy since 2000, and checks what it is like and how it operates today. Finally, it discusses inter-Korean economic cooperation and the possible economic landscape of a unified Korea.

This course is ...



The course examines the development process and status of North Korean agriculture and explores prospects for inter-Korean agricultural cooperation. Tracing the historical development of North Korean agriculture from the land reform and agricultural cooperative movement, the course then studies its current state, focusing on statistical data. Finally, on the premise of North Korea's future reforms and opening up, it discusses the specific forms of cooperation that could be possible if inter-Korean agricultural projects are fully launched in the future.
